ABOUT EDINBURGH CHILDREN'S HOSPITAL CHARITY (ECHC)

Edinburgh Children's Hospital Charity believes that nothing should get in the way of being a child. We exist to transform the lives of children and young people in hospital so they can be a child first and a patient second.

It is our privilege to continue to support over 110,000 babies, children and young people who come to The Royal Hospital for Children and Young People (RHCYP) - both locally and from across Scotland to access specialist services. We also continue to support the tens of thousands who attend other healthcare settings such as St John's Hospital in Livingston; community health centres across the Lothians, Borders and Fife; and Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services (CAMHS).

CHAIR'S FOREWORD

After another year of uncertainty, on behalf of the Trustees, I would like to extend our thanks to all our supporters, partners, volunteers and staff for everything they do for Edinburgh Children's Hospital Charity.

We entered 2021, like many, with cautious optimism. Although the roll-out of the covid-19 vaccine programme was progressing, Scotland entered 2021 in lockdown and we were unsure of our ability to raise funds and deliver against our objectives. We do not receive any statutory or government funding and therefore solely rely on donations. It is, therefore, heartening to be able to report that 2021 was a very successful year for ECHC and we were proud to continue our support of babies, children and families throughout.

We were pleased to support children, young people and their families at the old 'Sick Kids' hospital right up to the doors closing in March 2021. Since the move into the new Royal Hospital for Children and Young People we have continued our support and have been working more closely with departments to support children attending clinics, or staying overnight, to feel less anxious and to have opportunities to meet peers.

We continued to distribute through our Grants Programme, half a million pounds in 2021, supporting bereavement services, play, and research, as well as providing rewards and distractions. We continued our commitment to creating therapeutic, healing environments through several enhancement projects and, in partnership with the Welch Trust and NHS Lothian, we brought life changing epilepsy surgery to Scotland.

We are very grateful for the positive relationship which we have with NHS Lothian and Children's Services in particular. Working in partnership has allowed us to continue to deliver a range of wellbeing services to babies, children and young people at the time they need it most.

Across the charity, our incredible team of Trustees, staff and volunteers have allowed us to provide our vital services. Volunteers support us in our Wellbeing Hub, chaperoning artists on the wards, serving in the hospital shop, and supporting the fundraising, admin and finance functions of our office. Our staff team, once again, showed an outstanding level of enthusiasm and commitment. Against a backdrop of uncertainty around fundraising, events and activities, we were very pleased to have raised over £1.5 million in donations to fund our services. Further details are set out later in this report.

We were thrilled to win both the People's Choice and Charity of the Year awards at the SCVO Scottish Charity Awards 2021. The People's Choice award is voted for by the public, so it is very gratifying to have our work recognised by both our supporters and sector experts.

We end 2021 with a new three-year strategy, including plans for exciting new developments to further support children and young people at some of the most difficult of times. All of this is made possible by our loyal and generous supporters to whom we are incredibly grateful.

In total, we awarded 50 grants, including:

£140,000

to bring cutting edge laser surgery to Scotland for the first time, in partnership with the Welch Trust.

£45,000

to create a bespoke, child-friendly website for Children's Services in partnership with NHS Lothian.

£37,000

to create an outdoor Music Garden at the RHCYP for independent music-making for children and outdoor performances.

£22,000

to fund emergency brochoscope kits to urgently save babies' lives when no other ventilation option is possible.



We provided £4500 worth of sensory toys, games and equipment for children in need of physiotherapy and mental health support.



We provided special memory boxes for the palliative care team, made up of keepsake items to bring comfort to bereaved families.



We funded rewards, bravery certificates, stickers and welcome gifts for children and young people at the RHCYP, St John's Hospital and CAMHS Edinburgh.

Children's Wellbeing Services:

The Children's Wellbeing Team incorporates our Arts Programme, Wellbeing Hub, Hospital Youth Workers and Volunteer Service.



In 2021, 5361 children, young people, family members and staff participated in arts workshops and activities.



We held our first ever All in Bloom gardening competition which tasked the hospital staff to transform their outdoor spaces into 'Enchanted Gardens'.



Our Christmas activity programme was bigger than ever, with a Living Advent Calendar, Christmas light switch on, projections, inflatables, an advent window competition and even a superhero abseil!



We held an exciting week of activities to coincide with the 2020 Olympic Games, including an Olympic Torch Relay and indoor curling.



We are embarking on the LGBT Youth Scotland Charter, working towards the Silver Award to ensure children and young people from the LGBT community feel safe and supported when accessing our services.



Our Youth Group restarted face to face, with young people coming from as far as Dundee to take part.



We ran weekly creative sessions in CAMHS, including an interactive session to find out what kind of environment the young people wanted their space to feel like.



Arts/Hub volunteers were appointed to support the team and have volunteered a fantastic 216 hours since September.

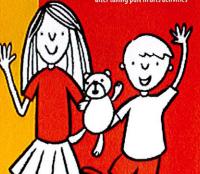

2021 Key Highlights

- The children's hospital moved to its new home at Little France in March and Team ECHC was on hand in the run up to and on the day of the move to support children, families and NHS colleagues where needed.
- We partnered with the Welch Trust to bring MRI-guided Laser Interstitial Thermal Therapy (LITT) to the hospital — the first time this laser technology will be available in Scotland - giving children and young people living with epilepsy the life-changing chance to be seizure free.
- Our St John's Children's Fund, which support babies, children and young people cared for by St John's Hospital and community healthcare settings across West Lothian, launched its maternity appeal.

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ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

NEW HOSPITAL

We are delighted that the new RHCYP is now open and caring for children and families from Edinburgh and beyond. ECHC staff and volunteers ensured a presence in the run up to and on the day of the move to support NHS colleagues where needed.

Children, young people and their families arrived at the new hospital to a round of applause from gathered staff. ECHC gave every child a welcome present and a limited-edition artwork and assisted the removal teams with wayfinding. Our Children's Wellbeing Team organised musical performances to create a calming yet welcoming environment, as well as fun and distracting activities on the wards throughout the week.

All 31 staff teams/depts throughout the building were given ECHC Welcome Hampers and we ran staff art classes in the Hub to support wellbeing.

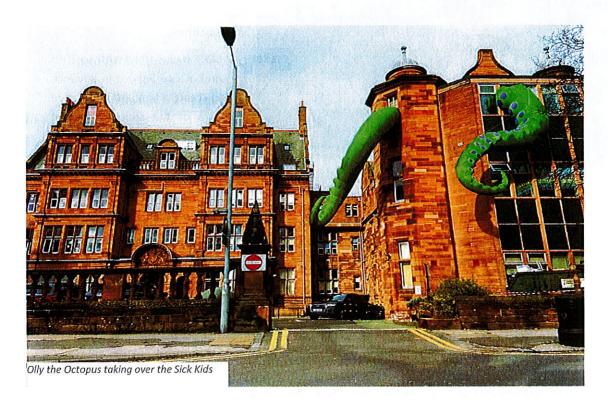
We worked very closely, in partnership, with NHS Comms to develop a communications strategy that focused on getting positive messages to children and young people. This ramped up in the week prior and highlighted the parts of the building which we had funded. Social media interactions at this time were the highest they have ever been for the charity.



Highlights from our move activities included:

Olly the Octopus

The weekend before the move, we displayed giant inflatable octopus tentacles from various windows at the Sick Kids. We then released the story that a giant octopus had taken over the building, so we would therefore need to move to our shiny new, octopus-free home just down the road at Little France. Olly was very popular with the local (as well as hospital) community and had a steady stream of visitors coming to see him and take photos over the weekend. Olly was also shared widely in the press and across social media. We have been told since that staff morale was given a considerable boost by the silliness of Occupation Octopus and most importantly it gave us a chance to speak out against some of the negative reporting that the building had received.



Farewell Film

In 2019, before the hospital move was delayed, we worked with videographer Laura Frood to create 'The Final Farewell' – a film in which Sick Kids staff shared their memories of and said goodbye to the children's hospital. We shared this across all social media channels five days before the move and said a heartfelt thank you to all the children, young people, families, staff and volunteers who made the Sick Kids more than a hospital for so many. It received a fantastic response and has been viewed over 42,000 times.

Sick Kids Time Capsule

As the Sick Kids is a building which means so much to so many, we wanted to honour its legacy and ensure all those who have passed through its doors could digitally revisit it in the future. We partnered

with virtual reality company Virtronix to create an online virtual time capsule of the RHSC and called out to families, supporters and staff to submit their memories, photos and videos for inclusion. The response was phenomenal and the time capsule currently includes over 1700 memories, as well as a 360° digital walkthrough of the building itself.

Ambulance Transfer Film



On the day of the move, around 28 babies, children and young people were transferred from RHSC to RHCYP by Scotstar and Scottish Ambulance from 8am to lunchtime.

ECHC had worked with Scottish Ambulance Service in advance to create a film and interactive map of the route. As some children being transferred couldn't see out of the windows of their ambulance, the film was played to them on

an iPad to create distraction and reduce anxiety.

In addition, ECHC was able to influence a previously made decision that children should travel alone; and got last minute agreement that one parent could travel with them.

"Kieran was so excited to be one of the very first kids to be transferred to the new children's hospital this week! The welcome we received when we arrived from the old hospital was absolutely world class. His face lit up the entire place!

Branding the RHCYP

We commissioned a branding company to assist us in making sure that those parts of the building which we have funded will be clearly visible to visitors. Phase one of the branding work included window and wall vinyls, adding our logo/illustrations/strapline to various areas of the hospital including The Hub, lift doors and playrooms, and branded noticeboards.

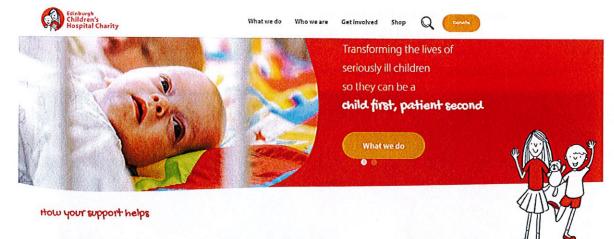

Grants Programme

ECHC distributes grants to the RHCYP and other children and young people's community healthcare settings. Applications can be accepted from any NHS staff member who can demonstrate that their application will deliver at least one of ECHC's four strategic outcomes and fit with our charitable purpose.

This year, we streamlined our grant application process by moving to a new online grant application system, making it easier than ever for applicants to request the funding they need. The new system enables applicants to fill out the form online via our website – saving significant time and alleviating administration.

In 2021, ECHC received 53 grant applications. Of these, 48 were approved, four are pending approval and one was declined. The majority of applications were funded with restricted funding sources; three were fully supported with unrestricted funds and five were funded with a combination of restricted and unrestricted funds.

Throughout the year we supported all wards within the hospital and provided support to other departments, as well as in other locations, including St John's Hospital in Livingston, Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services (CAMHS) and Sunndach and Calaréidh Respite Services. The awards made throughout the year supported children and young people with conditions including epilepsy, cancer, cystic fibrosis, Crohn's and colitis and pain.

Examples of new grants that were awarded this year are:

- Laser Interstitial Thermal Therapy (LITT): We partnered with the Welch Trust to provide £140k of funding to bring cutting edge LITT laser surgery to Scotland for the first time, giving children and young people living with epilepsy the life-changing chance to be seizure free.
- Life-saving airway kits: We provided funding of £22k for five emergency bronchoscope kits to urgently save babies' lives when they cannot breathe and where no other ventilation option

- is possible. The kits are placed in strategic locations across NHS Lothian, meaning they are readily available for use at key sites of local critical care.
- Children's Services Website: We provided funding of £45k to create a bespoke, standalone, child-friendly website for Children's Services in partnership with NHS Lothian. The launch of this coincided with the opening of the RHCYP.
- Play for Physiotherapy: We provided £4.5k of sensory toys, games and equipment for children in the care of the RHCYP Community Physiotherapy and CAMHS teams to encourage those in need of physiotherapy and mental health support to engage with treatment and build confidence.
- Jess Mackie Music Garden: We awarded over £37k to fund the creation of an outdoor Music Garden and Performance Space in the ground floor paediatric acute receiving unit (PARU) courtyard at the RHCYP. The garden's large static musical instruments mean that children can independently engage in music-making in the garden. It will also be used by our Children's Wellbeing Team for outdoor performances with artists and musicians.

Lauriston Outpatients Department: £50k of funding has been approved to deliver enhancements to the clinic rooms and waiting spaces within the department to create a welcoming, non-clinical environment which reduces visitor anxiety, helps to support engagement with treatment/appointments and creates a positive experience for children and their families.

- St John's Maternity Unit: In addition to funding a project to enhance St John's ED, we approved a grant of £40k to transform the hospital's maternity unit, to give new parents comfortable, welcoming and relaxing spaces for their first family moments together.
- Meet the Dental Team: We funded the creation of an interactive distraction tool noticeboard for the Dental Team, featuring illustrations of staff with and without PPE as well as clever magnetic laminates with interchangeable body parts, to encourage creative play and show children who really is behind the mask.
- Staying Connected: We funded two mobile Wi-Fi devices for the teams at Sunndach and Calaréidh respite centres so children can interact on Facetime and Zoom sessions, stream movies and music and access a wealth of online activities. Many of the children staying at the respite centres are unable to speak, so communication and sensory stimulation in the form of music and colour is a vital and significant enhancement to their lives.

In addition to the new projects we supported in 2021, we also continued to provide funding for ongoing projects. Examples of these are:

- "Talk To Us' a joint project with 6VT Edinburgh City Youth Cafe which supports 13-18 year olds who may have been victims of crime; have misused alcohol or substances; or who may be at risk of self-harm. The service is the first of its kind for young people in Scotland and the team supports the RHCYP Emergency Department team on Friday and Saturday nights.
- KILTS -- We provided a research grant of £10k to continue to support the Kids Liver Trends in Scotland (KILTS) research project - a project we have supported over the past three years. This project's aim is to allow for the best possible care for children with chronic liver disease with better data to inform local and regional health services.
- We continued to fund rewards, bravery certificates, stickers and welcome gifts for children and young people at the children's hospital, at St John's and in CAMHS.
- We continued our funding of the entire hospital voluntary services team, supported staff wellbeing and provided toys, books and games for the playrooms throughout the hospital.
- Memory Making for Bereaved Families: We provide the Palliative Care team with an annual grant of £10k, which funds items including memory boxes, charms, framed hand and foot casts and quilts. These enable the team to support children and young people approaching end of life with creating memories with their families before death.

Giving Children with Epilepsy the Chance to be Seizure Free

We are thrilled to have been instrumental in bringing world class laser surgery to the RHCYP, giving children and young people living with severe epilepsy in Scotland the life-changing chance to be seizure free.

Our partnership with the Welch Trust and NHS Lothian is bringing MRI-guided Laser Interstitial Thermal Therapy (LITT) to the hospital – the first time this laser technology will be available in Scotland.

LITT is a new, minimally invasive treatment which uses a laser to remove brain tissue that is causing seizures. Children and young people who will be referred for laser surgery are diagnosed with refractory (medication resistant) epilepsy; they may experience up to 100 'drop down' seizures a day. In appropriately selected cases, laser surgery can stop seizures entirely and cure the child's epilepsy.

LITT surgery treatment is currently only available at Great Ormond Street Hospital (GOSH) and in Houston, Texas. The current surgery choice practiced in Edinburgh is open brain surgery, which lasts around seven hours and results in an ear to ear scar. The LITT precision technology will reduce this surgery time to around two hours and is much less invasive.

"Having the laser surgery available in Edinburgh gives families more choice in their place of care and means they will no longer need to endure the financial and emotional cost of national or international travel and separation at a very stressful time. It will also place Edinburgh on the map as a world-leading provider of epilepsy surgery and treatment." – Roslyn Neely, CEO of ECHC

Children's Wellbeing Services

The Children's Wellbeing team, which incorporates our Arts Programme, Wellbeing Hub, Hospital Youth Workers and Volunteer Service settled well into their new home at the RHCYP. From March onwards, there was a steady increase in demand for their services and a significant increase in requests for support from wards and departments.

The team continued to grow, with a Children's Wellbeing Officer, Arts Commissions Coordinator and Assistant Project Worker appointed this year, all of whom have settled into their roles well.

The appointment of the Children's Wellbeing Officer enabled one-to-one support for children and young people on the wards to resume. From June the team were able to slowly welcome children, young people and families back into The Hub and, since September, it has continued to gather momentum, with 116 families supported in November.

The team were crowned the very worthy winners of a Health and Wellbeing Award at the Scottish Children's Health Awards 2021. The judging panel commented that they were amazed at the sheer scale of what they do, providing support from the moment children, young people and families arrive at the hospital. We are enormously grateful to the panel for voting for us, and to the children, young people and their families for all their kind words and wonderful feedback which was instrumental to us securing the win.

Arts Programme & Youth Work

and balloons.

Our innovative arts and activities programme, the only one of its kind in any of Scotland's healthcare settings, delivers exciting workshops at RHCYP as well as within community health settings including Queen Margaret Hospital and Musselburgh Care Centre.

Pre-Covid, the team ran over 1,000 arts workshops per year in the hospital and in other NHS Lothian healthcare settings. This year, while still working within Covid restrictions, we have been able to rebuild the service delivering 558 workshops to babies, children and young people staying in hospital and using community healthcare settings. The team transform bedsides into art galleries and waiting areas into discos to bring fun, laughter and distraction when they are needed most. Whether it's magic, music or messy play, the activities help children and young people to have a positive experience from the

moment they begin their healthcare journey. Highlights include:

- Continued to deliver our five day a week Core programme, with weekend activities also taking place as part of our Christmas Living Advent Calendar. Core activities include dance with Theiya Arts and Dance Base, Tinderbox Music, Baby Sensory, Magic and ECHC's Art Carts. This year marked resident magician Tricky Ricky's 25 year anniversary, and we gifted him with a hoodie and a trophy, as well as a cake, a banner
- To coincide with the 2020 Olympic Games, we held an exciting week of 'RHCYP Olympics' activities,

- including an Olympic Torch Relay featuring a 2012 London Olympic torch and indoor curling in the hospital wards, corridors and garden spaces.
- Our Easter Bonnet Parade ran for its sixth year. In the two weeks leading up to Easter, children
 and young people on the wards decorated their Easter bonnets, which were then put up as a
 parade on our social channels, with the winners judged by our Royal Patron, HRH Princess
 Beatrice.
- October saw a fun, seven-day week of Halloween activities, including a Spooky Animation session, potion making, a slime lab and costume making. These activities were a great segue into introducing The Hub, and from this we gained some regular visitors.
- We held our first ever All In Bloom garden competition which tasked the hospital ward staff to transform their outdoor spaces into 'Enchanted Gardens.' The competition was a huge success and was judged by horticulturist and BBC's Beechgrove Garden presenter Kirsty Wilson. 100 All in Bloom boxes filled with garden themed activities were also distributed to children and young people on the wards to coincide with the competition.

- Our first live-streamed screening was held in The Pod using the purpose-built cinema projector. Scottish Book Trust brought their project 'The World made a Rainbow' for Mental Health Awareness week.
- Our first performance in The Pod and Castle Mey music garden was held in September.
 Tinderbox Orchestra played a Sunday afternoon performance and we even had the young people conducting the orchestra.

- Studio Boxes designed during Covid restrictions to bring arts activities to children while our artists were unable to visit the wards. These boxes proved so successful that they have continued to be used throughout 2021, with new themed boxes being developed to respond to the hospital's needs. A total of 3630 provided throughout the RHCYP, as well as to St John's hospital, Queen Margaret hospital and Lauriston CAMHS.
- We are embarking on the LGBT Youth Scotland Charter. We will be working towards the Silver Award with NHS Lothian, 6VT Youth Café and Healthy Respect. This is a great chance for us to work with these three organisations to be sure that children and young people from the LGBT community feel safe and supported when accessing our services.
- We continued our support of Sunndach and Calareidh respite services through weekly music and storytelling sessions, Wellbeing Boxes for staff, Studio Boxes to support their summer festival and Christmas decorations.
- CAMHS IPU sessions we continued to run weekly creative sessions in CAMHS, including a
 creative, interactive consultation session to find out what kind of environment the young
 people wanted their space to feel like.
- Our youth group restarted face to face in September, with young people coming as far as from Dundee to take part. As part of this, we ran a four-week song writing workshop with Tinderbox Collective, where the young people collaborated on a song to be used at ECHC's Sports Quiz.
- Trialled visits from a yoga practitioner who supports young people with bespoke relaxation, breathing exercises and gentle movement. Feedback was very positive.

A December to Remember

For our first Christmas in the new hospital, we were determined to make it bigger and better than ever before. All of this year's activities tied in with the Fundraising and Marketing team's #LightUpChristmas appeal, and highlights included:

 Living Advent Calendar - Once again, we ran our Christmas Advent Calendar which sees a new surprise activity or workshop revealed for all 24 days of December. This year, each activity was accompanied by an Advent Calendar projection.

- Advent Calendar Projections We were keen to have a new, creative way to reveal the activity of the day, so commissioned illustrator and animator Henry Cruickshank to design an animation that counted down to the day's activity. Henry worked with children and young people in the hospital who created their own characters which he incorporated into the final design. The animations were projected daily on to the spine wall in the Atrium.
- Christmas Tree Light Switch On We worked with Bouygues, NHS Lothian, Conifox Adventure Park, Edinburgh City Council and Field and Lawn to erect and dress a 22ft Christmas tree outside the main hospital entrance. We then invited children, families and staff to a Christmas Light Switch On event, hosted by Forth One's Boogie in the Morning. Baby Joey, the star of our Christmas fundraising campaign, and his family pressed the big red button to switch on the tree lights and officially begin the countdown to Christmas.

- Superhero Abseil Children and young people were given a Marvel-lous surprise when a team of costume-clad superheroes and villains scaled the side of the hospital. The team from Edinburgh Rope Access abseiled into Lochranza garden and past Dalhousie and Dirleton wards into the staff courtyard to make sure as many families had the chance to see the spectacle as possible.
- Inflatables Thanks to a kind donation from Mega Inflatables, we transformed the Hub courtyard with beautiful 5ft LED inflatable candles.

- Competition 24 staff teams were given an Advent Calendar window and materials to decorate it with a festive theme to spread Christmas cheer around the hospital. There were so many impressive entries from Santa arriving on the helipad to snowy mountain scenes. In the end we all agreed the Emergency Department's clever version of 'Christmas Past' (in the old Sick Kids) and 'Christmas Present' (in the RHCYP) was a very worthy winner.
- Christmas Trees and Decorations –
 We sourced a 10ft metal tree for the
 Pod and had laminated Christmas
 trees designed for each bed space to
 ensure we met infection control and
 fire safety regulations. Each bedspace
 was given a window hung LED
 Christmas decoration.

Commissions

A new Art Commissions Coordinator was employed this year to coordinate enhancements in the hospital and community healthcare settings. They have since been working alongside designers to facilitate enhancements to St John's Hospital's A&E department and working with East Lothian Community Hospital to facilitate enhancements to the children's waiting spaces.

We were approached by the dentistry team to come up with a solution to their problem of being unrecognisable when dressed in PPE. We commissioned artist Mick Peter to design a series of "crazy body parts" to be placed under photographic portraits of the dental staff in full PPE. Children can easily swap heads, middles and legs to transform the staff team into robots, ballerinas and frogs, encouraging creative play and easing anxieties.

As many consultants are having to hold appointments virtually to discourage large numbers of children from coming to the hospital, we also worked with NHS Lothian to create a child friendly poster called 'Near Me', explaining how the video appointment with their doctor or nurse will work.

Volunteer Services

Volunteers have been instrumental in supporting the Children's Wellbeing Team with establishing their service offering within the new hospital. Arts/Hub volunteers were appointed this year to support the team and, since September, have volunteered a fantastic 216 hours. Volunteers also supported the shop throughout Covid and beyond, fundraising events including the Ultimate Sports Quiz, community activities at The Gyle and our Christmas choirs at the Dome.

All current volunteers and those who supported us during the pandemic will now receive a 'Volunteer Hero' badge, and we are working on creating gold, silver and bronze badges for long service recognition.

We would like to say an enormous thank you to all our volunteers who give up their time and continue to go above and beyond to support children, young people, families and staff at the hospital.



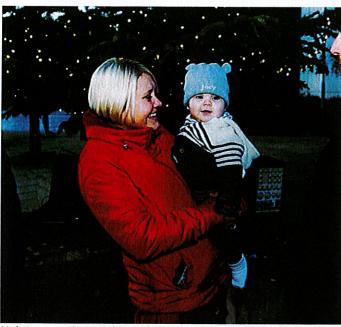

Voluntary Income

The pandemic continued to impact fundraising income streams in 2021, though the return of sports challenges - and events and community fundraising in the latter part of the year – was very positive.

Voluntary income for the twelve months to 31 December 2021 was £1,508,065 a slight increase on 2020's income of £1,506,032.

Following the opening of the new hospital, the Fundraising and Marketing team have a base in the Family Support corridor of RHCYP and have a presence five days per week.

We ran two fundraising appeals in 2021 – More Than A Hospital to coincide with the hospital move to the RHCYP and Light Up Christmas, both of which used case studies to ensure children were at the heart of our ask, and donation options to showcase the work of ECHC and the difference a gift can make.

More Than A Hospital raised £6,766 and Light Up Christmas raised £144,053. Our heartfelt thanks go to the families who shared their stories and ECHC's generous supporters for their donations.

"ECHC was there for us at every turn. The charity's activities gave us a break from our daily reality. Seeing Joey respond to bubbles in baby sensory sessions, and hearing singing and live music was wonderful. It gave us hope. The change that came over the ward when the charity arrived was amazing, everyone's faces lit up.

St John's Children's Fund was launched through a targeted mailing and new social media channels. Our initial appeal is supporting the enhancement of the maternity unit and the generosity of the Livingston community has been overwhelming. Livingston FC, local churches and Brownies group, Primark (Livingston), local group PJ Foundation and many local families have helped raise funds and awareness of supporting children's services across West Lothian.

Fundraising from corporate supporters continued to be challenging, particularly those partners who rely on employee fundraising as many employees continued to work from home, however support

from long term ECHC friends such as Walter Scott, Rockstar North, Intergen and Baillie Gifford was bolstered by a new partnership with Gillespie McAndrew. Our thanks go to all corporate supporters throughout the year including those who gifted a door of the Living Advent Calendar over Christmas.

The National Collective working group, made up of Glasgow Children's Hospital Charity (GCHC), The Archie Foundation and ECHC, secured a nationwide fundraising week with all Morrisons stores in Scotland. 2022 plans for the collective include launching as 'Scotland's Children's Hospitals' and we will be looking for national partners to join this exciting opportunity to make a difference to all children in hospital across Scotland.

The resurgence of community fundraising towards the end of the year provided a fantastic boost to income. We were delighted to welcome our choir and brass band supporters back to the steps of The Dome for performances throughout December, and to hold collections at both The Gyle and on three occasions at the pantomime at The Kings Theatre.

More than ever, we are reliant on the support of Charitable trusts and corporate foundations. We are grateful to all funders for enabling our work and always welcome conversations with those interested in supporting our services.

A huge number of supporters donned their red ECHC T-shirts to take part in sports challenges, collectively raising £255,820. While official large-scale events were still hampered by restrictions, more supporters than ever before organised their own challenges. ECHC supporters have climbed Canada's 5 Peaks, run a marathon a month and have been wild swimming every day of December. Families of the hospital continue to inspire us, with long standing ECHC supporter Donna Nelson raising over £10,000 by swimming 20km in St Mary's Loch in memory of her son Christopher.

The Lap the Map challenge, in partnership with GCHC, returned for a second year and saw over 1000 'Lappers' joining the mighty Team Edinburgh! It was a close race this year, with Team Glasgow just getting the win in the last hours, but Team Edinburgh did us proud raising £40,617. Tour de Little France, our inaugural cycling challenge launched in June and took place during the three weeks of the official 'Tour'. 50 cyclists took part, with £5,500 raised. Our Save Point gaming marathon was also a huge success. With Rockstar North's backing, it saw 45 participants raise a phenomenal £45,697.

Finally, thanks to the efforts of our Fundraising Committee, led by Fundraising Ambassador Frankie Cusack and the commitment of our Sports Quiz enthusiasts, we were thrilled to have our Ultimate Sports Quiz return for 2021 – our first in person event since 2019. A full house of supporters attended and raised over £100k.

In the current uncertain climate, fundraising remains challenging and the staff and volunteer team continues to work collaboratively and creatively to adapt and make the most of the changing fundraising landscape, digital technologies, and face to face fundraising.

We operate in a highly competitive arena and understand that the public make a choice to support ECHC over many other deserving charities. The charity is indebted to everyone who gave a donation, shared our appeals, took part in an event, sang, shook a bucket and volunteered. We would like to thank all supporters for standing by ECHC during another challenging year for everyone.

We would encourage anyone interested in transforming children's healthcare to contact us directly to discuss supporting ECHC. We work hard to match funders' wishes to our most urgent priorities in the

hospital. We are proud to show funders the difference their support makes through progress reports, sharing case studies and first hand through service visits.

- In 2021, overall had 1,700 participants run, walk, jump and cycle for Edinburgh Children's Hospital Charity
 - 33 thrill seeking fundraisers jumped out of a plane at 10,000 feet

Retail

At the beginning of 2021, we were running two shops concurrently having opened a new shop within the main entrance area of the RHCYP in May 2020 to support the opening of the Department of Clinical Neurosciences. In addition, the original shop in the RHSC continued to operate until March 2021, when it was closed in conjunction with the RHSC move to RHCYP.

The new shop at RHCYP is now operating a full seven day a week service thanks to our wonderful staff of volunteers and it continues to provide a vital lifeline to children, families and NHS staff, particularly during lockdown at the beginning of this year.

The shop also serves a vital role of raising money and awareness for ECHC with all profits being transferred from ECHC's trading company Task Trading to ECHC at the end of the year and used for charitable purposes. Since opening, footfall has continued to increase along with sales with the new shop benefitting from its prime location in the busy atrium and its reputation amongst staff and visitors for its product range, friendly welcome and longer opening hours.

Covid restrictions continue to be implemented where necessary, with a one-way system, limit on customers coming in, social distancing, safety screens and contactless payment all having been in place at times throughout 2021.

We are enormously grateful and continue to be overwhelmed by the support from volunteers (new and existing) who have been instrumental in helping the shop go from strength to strength through the pandemic.

Some fun facts about the shop...

- The most popular chocolate bars are Orange Twirls (5,000 per year) and Giant Buttons
 - We sell about 200 cans of Pepsi Max a week that's 10,400 a year
 - 670 sandwiches are sold every week nearly 35,000 per year
- We sell about 50 cuddly toys a week with Monkeys and Mermaids the most popular (2,500 per year)

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Total income for the year to 31 December 2021 equalled £1,799,513 (£1,681,781 in the year to 31 December 2020) and total expenditure equalled £1,726,121 (£1,821,503 in 2020). The total net income was £73,392 (net expenditure of £139,722 in 2020).

Details are provided in the following paragraphs and further analysis is provided in the notes to the accounts.

Reserves Policy

At any one time, ECHC holds funds which have been restricted by either the charity or supporters for a specific purpose. This is managed in line with our 'Policy on Management of Restricted Funds'.

Funds at 31 December 2021 totalled £2,505,412 (£2,432,020 at 31 December 2020) of which £938,181 (£835,832 at 31 December 2020) represents Restricted Funds (funds received which are earmarked by the donor for a specific ward, department or project) and £1,567,231 (£1,596,188 at 31 December 2020) represents Unrestricted Funds.

Out of the unrestricted funds, the Trustees have designated a sum totalling £164,447 which will be spent on specific projects during the next year. This is shown separately in the balance sheet as Designated Funds.

Historically, a sum of money equivalent to six months operating costs have been allocated to the Operating Fund.

During the past two years, the charity has been able to successfully navigate the impact of Covid-19 despite the significant impact the pandemic had on a large number of our core income streams. Success came partially through the charity's ability to react to the changing landscape, by revising its fundraising strategy and focusing on prioritising those income streams still available which provided the highest return on investment, and partially due to its ability to be agile due to the discretionary nature of much of its spend.

Due to the resilience that the charity has shown, its ability to be agile again should the need arise, the confidence in the plans for 2022 that have been developed in line with a detailed budgeting process as well as the significant rise in demand for the services provided by our Children's Wellbeing Service, the Trustees have deemed that the appropriate level of funds for the charity to allocate to the Operating Fund this this year should be sufficient to cover an orderly winding up of the charity (£ 230,000). This ensures that the relevant funds would be available in a worse-case scenario but results in a larger proportion of funds being available to deliver an increasing programme of support to children, young people and babies whilst the charity continues to regrow its traditional income streams previously halted by Covid-19. Detailed monitoring and response plans have been developed and implemented to ensure that in the event of unforeseen drop in income, actions can be taken to ensure their remains sufficient headroom in the level of unallocated unrestricted reserves to safeguard the financial stability of the charity.

Going Concern

In light of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Trustees have carefully considered the continued impact of COVID-19 on the charity and have undertaken a detailed going concern review.

Despite the impact that the pandemic has had on key income streams, ECHC have performed strongly over the past two years. Whilst it appears promising that these income streams will start to rebuild in 2022 (for example in November 2021, ECHC held its first large event since 2019 and expect its flagship events to take place in 2022), it is likely that COVID-19 will continue to have an impact on the charity's ability to generate income. As such, financial modelling has been undertaken to reflect the actions that can be taken to ensure the charity can continue to operate going forward both in the short-term and beyond if this is the case.

The Trustees are satisfied that the accounts should be prepared on a going concern basis taking comfort in the resilience of the charity given:

- The strength of the charity's cash position and level of reserves
- The charity's ability to be agile due to the discretionary nature of much of its expenditure. The grants programme and large parts of the Children's Wellbeing Service can be stopped, delayed or reduced, as required, providing the charity with flexibility and control over a large proportion of its expenditure
- During the past two years, the charity has been able to successfully revise its fundraising strategy to focus on prioritising those income streams still available which provided the highest return on investment. Whilst the budget for 2022 assumes the rebuilding of those income streams that have been predominately on pause for the past two years, the charity's ability to be flexible and react to the changing landscape has been proven and a similar approach can be taken if there are further restrictions that limit the fundraising activity that has been planned.

Risk Management

Senior Management Team continually evaluate and mitigate the risks faced by the Charity on an ongoing basis throughout the year. The charity's risk register is the framework used to set out the current and ongoing identified risks faced by the charity and the mitigants and controls that have been put in place to reduce the impact of each risk.

Historically, the risk register was reviewed twice yearly by the Audit Committee and Board of Trustees however during the pandemic it was deemed appropriate for there to be a more regular examination of the risk faced by the charity and as such a full review of the charity's risk register was undertaken by the Senior Management Team ahead of each Board Meeting where an update was provided to Trustees.

The principal risk to the charity during this time remained the impact of the Covid-19 pandemic. Due to the mitigations put in place which included: revising the fundraising and marketing strategy; undertaking a detailed recovery planning and budgeting exercise; continually evaluating activity and expenditure; as well as ensuring business continuity plans were in place to ensure services and operations could continue to be delivered despite the impact of covid on restrictions and on staff, the charity has shown its resilience and ability to react quickly to ensure its financial stability whilst still delivering on our charitable objectives through the Children's Wellbeing Service and Grants Programme.

The Senior Management Team continue to keep areas of potential risk under constant review, however with the impact of Covid on the charity having eased, the decision was taken in Summer 2021

to return to a twice yearly report by the Senior Management Team to the Audit Committee and Board of Trustees.

FUTURE PLANS

Throughout the pandemic, ECHC has remained able to provide services and support to babies, children, young people in hospital and at home. The focus throughout this time period has been on recovering from the immediate impacts of the pandemic, such as loss of income. We are pleased to now be able to consider the future, with a focus on rebuilding stronger and sustainably.

Trustees considered a new three-year strategy for the organisation at their Awayday in December 2021. We remain committed to nothing getting in the way of being a child. Our aim is to transform the lives and experiences of children and young people in hospital and healthcare so they can be a child first and a patient second.

Our long-term vision is to...

- improve every child and young person's experience of hospital and healthcare by supporting them (and their whole family) through their hospital journey with innovative support services which reduce anxiety and isolation, increase self-esteem and encourage positive relationships with each other and care providers.
- transform the clinical outcomes of children and young people across the globe by funding world class medical care, ground-breaking research and equipment.
- address the mental health crisis experienced by children and young people, and support them
 and their families, by offering a safe place to turn to and a programme of interventions which
 builds resilience and improves wellbeing.
- change the lives of children across the UK by using evidence of our success to encourage the adoption of our Wellbeing and Resilience Programme by other children's health organisations across the country.
- change the face of children's healthcare by being a leading, global voice for children in hospital
 and advocate for the benefits and importance of non-medical interventions and therapeutic,
 healing environments in all children's healthcare settings.
- ensure children's healthcare rights are respected by promoting these to health professionals, policy and decision makers and by giving children and their families opportunities to have their own voices heard in relation to their healthcare rights.

Our Organisational Strategy for 2022-2025 sets out four strategic goals:

- To Transform Lives
- To Deliver Innovation
- To Build Lasting Relationships
- To Tell Our Story

There are several exciting projects which will be developed and rolled out from 2022. These include:

- Supporting the wellbeing of children and young people in isolation rooms through the delivery of our unique Space Academy programme, rolled out from 2022 (thanks to funding from Barclays).
- Designing, piloting, evaluating and rolling out a bespoke programme of Wellbeing and Resilience for children and young people on the CAMHS waiting list (thanks to funding from one of our supporters)
- Creating therapeutic, healing environments which support anxiety reduction and distraction through the delivery of high-quality enhancement projects in healthcare settings.
- Delivering a range of condition specific support sessions and activities in The Hub in partnership with clinical teams
- Improving the experience of children, young people and families through the expansion of our volunteering service
- Developing a range of merchandise and an online shopping facility, including offering a 'gift delivery' service to bedsides and wards
- Providing evidence of the difference we make, increase awareness of our work and inspire support through the appointment of a Social Impact Manager (thanks to funding from Scottish Government Adapt and Thrive)
- Improving our inclusivity by achieving the LGBT Silver Charter
- An anticipated return to regular fundraising events.

All actions are detailed in departmental priority plans and monitored regularly by the lead Senior Manager and their team. Performance is reported at Senior Management Team meetings with reports on progress against the strategy being received by the Board annually.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Edinburgh Children's Hospital Charity was formed as an unincorporated association on 7 December 1992. On 1 October 2010 the assets and liabilities of the association were transferred into a company limited by guarantee, then called The Sick Kids Friends Foundation. The 'Memorandum and Articles of Association' is the governing document for the organisation and sets out the charitable purpose and governance structure. ECHC is recognised by HM Revenue & Customs as a charity and is registered with the Office of the Charity Regulator (OSCR) as a Scottish Charity with Scottish Charity Number SC 020862.

These accounts are the eleventh accounts of the charity in the form of a company limited by guarantee and cover the twelve months to 31 December 2021.

Trustees

The Directors of the Company (the Trustees) are responsible for the strategy and governance of the Charity and monitoring performance in line with the strategic objectives. The Trustees include members with professional experience in public sector (including health and education) and private

sector (including retail, property, legal and financial services). The responsibility for delivering the strategy is delegated by the Board to the staff team.

There are currently 11 Trustees who are all volunteers. Biographies of the Trustees are given on the ECHC website. They receive no remuneration other than reasonable expenses, such as travel, should they wish to claim it. No expenses were claimed during the year. When being recruited, Trustees undergo a selection process led by a delegated Governance Sub-Committee. All Trustees have a Role Description and Person Specification, sign up to the ECHC Trustee Code of Conduct and complete a Register of Interests annually. A full induction is provided to each new Trustee including the provision of a Trustee Handbook which provides helpful information about the organisation. Informal training is provided throughout the year covering areas including legal, governance and compliance. Board Effectiveness reviews were introduced in 2017. Opportunities are offered to the Trustees for touring RHCYP and shadowing the Children's Wellbeing Service Team.

The Board also hold an away day each year to review the strategic direction of the charity.

The Trustees on an ongoing basis give consideration to the range of skills and experience on the Board. During the twelve months (and up to the signing of these accounts) there were the following changes to the Board of Trustees:

- Robin Blacklock, a Property Director, retired from the Board in April 2021.
- Dr Louise Potter, a Consultant Clinical Psychologist who runs a private practise following eight years of experience within the NHS, joined the Board in February 2021.
- Jon McCormack, a Consultant Paediatric Anaesthetist at RHCYP, joined the Board in December 2021.
- Angus Blacklock, was appointed in February 2022 following a recruitment process which targeted attracting younger applicants to the Board. Angus has personal experience of the hospital services and has been an Ambassador and fundraised for the charity in the past.

The Trustees would like to record their grateful thanks to Robin Blacklock, who has been a supportive and dedicated member of the Board since 2013 having started out with ECHC as a fundraising supporter inspired by his son Angus' hospital journey at RHSC. Robin and his friends and family have undertaken numerous fundraising challenges since 2011 and have helped to raise hundreds of thousands of pounds for charities, including ECHC over this time.

Decision Making

The Trustees meet regularly to monitor progress, decide on applications and receive reports. A schedule of meetings is agreed annually. The Trustees approved the current Strategy in December 2021 and on an annual basis a budget for income and expenditure is approved. Responsibility for delivering the strategy is delegated to the Chief Executive and staff as detailed in the Scheme of Delegation and Sub-Committee Terms of Reference. Regular reports on progress are given at Trustee meetings.

There are three sub-committees, which meet as required and make recommendations to the Board. These are:

Audit Committee

The Audit Committee meet up to three times a year and comprises two Trustees and one non-Trustee.

The committee receives reports from the CEO and the finance team on financial activity, systems and processes. Each year the organisation undergoes an audit whereby the robustness of ECHC's financial processes is assessed. The auditors report to the Trustees on any issues or areas requiring improvement.

Grants Committee

The Grants Committee, who meet three times a year and comprise both Trustees and external members, are responsible for:

- Having oversight of grant applications for amounts less than £5,000 which are granted by the
 CEO
- Considering and approving grant applications for amounts of £5,000 up to £50,000
- Advising the full Trustee board on grant applications for amounts over £50,000.

Governance Committee

The Governance Committee take delegated responsibility on behalf of the board of trustees for ensuring effective and improving governance.

They are responsible for:

- Considering and make recommendations to the board on all matters relating to governance
- Considering and advising the board on the composition and balance of the board
- Nominating and determining the process for selecting candidates to be recommended for appointment to the board and committees
- Developing and recommending to the board policies and procedures
- Reviewing and advising the board on the charity's pay awards

Management

The charity is led by the Chief Executive and has four senior managers, the Director of Relationships; Director of Corporate Development; the Chief Operating Officer and the Director of Children's Wellbeing Services.

Organisational structure

The staff team is made up of:

- The Chief Executive
- Fundraising and marketing team
- Finance and operations team
- Children's Wellbeing Services Team
- A Shop Manager and team
- Admin support

The team comprises ten full time staff and fifteen part-time staff on average throughout the year.

Finance and Administration

The organisation has robust financial management procedures. These include processes for committing the organisation to expenditure, ordering from suppliers and cash handling.

All staff play an important role in ensuring that financial management policies and processes are followed at all times.

An income and expenditure budget is developed annually with input from all staff. This is approved by the Trustees and progress against the budget is monitored through monthly management accounts.

ECHC also has robust policies and procedures in relation to information governance (the storing, management and processing of personal data). All supporter information is stored on our Raisers Edge database in line with Data Protection legislation.

Salary review

A salary review was conducted in 2021 by an external HR consultant. In considering this, the consultant benchmarked against a number of charities, including two with similar purpose; used online salary comparison sites; and considered the scope and salary of similar posts advertised in sector recruitment sites. The pay of senior management was subject to the same approach.

Whilst the large majority of roles were considered to be in line with the market, a small number of roles were deemed to be slightly out of kilter and an adjustment to these roles was proposed to and approved by the Governance Committee and Board of Trustees.

Connected Bodies

Task Trading Limited is a wholly owned subsidiary company through which the trading activities for Edinburgh Children's Hospital Charity are carried on. Task Trading Limited shares its principal address with Edinburgh Children's Hospital Charity. Gross income for the year to 31 December 2021 amounted to £288,501 (£170,214 in 2020) with the significant increase being due to the excellent performance of the shop since it has moved into the new RHCYP at Little France where it is located in a more prominent position within the hospital, with higher footfall. The net profit to be gifted to Edinburgh Children's Hospital Charity for the year to 31 December 2021 was £39,995 (£696 in 2020). The Sick Kids Friends (Little France) Limited was set up in December 2010 and has not traded.

Relationship between the Charity and Related Parties

- Task Trading Ltd was set up as the trading company of the charity and donates its profits to the charity under the Gift Aid Scheme on an annual basis.
- As at the year end, two Trustees, Lindsay Gardiner (Chair) and John Brodie are directors of Task Trading Ltd. The CEO of ECHC, Roslyn Neely, is also a director of Task Trading.
- One Trustee, Lindsay Gardiner (Chair) is a director of The Sick Kids Friends (Little France)
 Limited, as is the CEO of ECHC, Roslyn Neely.
- One Trustee, John Brodie (CEO of Scotmid) has continued to support our retail activities throughout the year.
- One Trustee, Fiona Linklater was a Director at Lindsays. During 2021 we received employment law advice from a colleague of Fiona's at Lindsays to the value of £324.

- One Trustee, Jon McCormack, is employed by NHS Lothian.
- One member of the Grants Committee, Paul Leonard, is a Consultant in Emergency Medicine at the RHSC. During the year, the Emergency department has benefitted from grants provided by ECHC.

Auditors

Henderson Loggie LLP were re-appointed by the members at the Annual General Meeting in October 2021. So far as each Trustee is aware, there is no relevant audit information of which the auditors are unaware. Each Trustee has taken the appropriate steps to make themselves aware of such information and to establish that the auditors are aware of it. The Trustees' report is prepared in accordance with special provisions of the Companies Act 2006 relating to small companies.

Notes to the financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2021

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historic cost convention. The charity is a public benefit entity and a company limited by guarantee, incorporated in Scotland with the registered office as noted on page 65. The financial statements are compliant with the charity's Articles, the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006, the Companies Act 2006, the Statement of Recommended Practice FRS102 (SORP FRS102) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" (revised 2015) and in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard 102 (FRS102). The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are set out below. The financial statements are prepared in pounds sterling which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts are rounded to the nearest pound.

Going Concern

These accounts have been prepared on a going concern basis. The Trustees have carefully considered the potential impacts of COVID-19 on the charity and believe that it is appropriate to prepare accounts on a going concern basis due to the following. Further information is given on page 28.

- The charity is in a strong cash position, with a high level of reserves
- The charity has the ability to be agile. Much of the charity's expenditure, as a grant-giving charity, is discretionary and can be stopped or delayed as required.
- During the past two years, the charity has been able to successfully revise its fundraising strategy and has performed well, generating income through planned activity that focuses on those income streams still available which provided the highest return on investment. Whilst the budget for 2022 assumes the rebuilding of those income streams that have been predominately on pause for the past two years, the charity's ability to be flexible and react to the changing landscape has been proven and a similar approach can be taken if there are further restrictions that limit the fundraising activity that has been planned.

Group financial statements

These financial statements consolidate the results of the charity and its wholly owned subsidiary Task Trading Limited on a line by line basis incorporating income and expenditure under activities and expenditure on raising funds respectively.

Critical accounting judgements and estimation uncertainty

In preparing the financial statements, the Trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions, which may affect reported income, expenses, assets and liabilities. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors considered relevant. Actual results may differ from such estimates. Judgements made in preparing these financial statements comprise:

- The assessment of leases to determine whether the risks and rewards of ownership remain with the lessor or are transferred to the Charity.
- Tangible fixed assets are depreciated over a period to reflect their estimated useful lives. The applicability of the assumed lives is reviewed annually, taking into account factors such as physical condition, maintenance and obsolescence.
- Fixed assets are also assessed as to whether there are indicators of impairment. This assessment involves consideration of the economic viability of the purpose for which the asset is used.

Recognition of income

Donations and legacies income, which also includes gifts and grants, including government grants, that provide core funding or are of a general nature, is recognised where there is entitlement, probability of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability. Income tax reclaims are recognised when claimed.

Notes to the financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2021

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

Gifts in kind

Where gifts in kind are donated for the purposes of auction or other sale the proceeds from the auction are included in the donations and legacies figures in the Statement of Financial Activities. Where goods or services are donated directly to Edinburgh Children's Hospital Charity these are included in the Statement of Financial Activities if the value is known with any certainty or in fixed assets, where appropriate. If there is uncertainty over the quantification of donations these are noted in the financial statements, if significant. Where goods are held for distribution to beneficiaries they are held in stock at fair value. The general volunteer time of the volunteers is not recognised.

Grants payable

Grants awarded are recognised in full in the period in which they are payable.

Expenditure on Raising Funds

The expenditure on raising funds consists of direct expenditure, trading activity costs, investment management costs and an apportionment of overhead and support costs as shown in note 7.

Charitable activities

Expenditure on charitable activities includes grants made, direct expenditure on charitable activities, and an apportionment of overhead and support costs as shown in note 7.

Pensions

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme. The amount charged to the income and expenditure account represents the contribution payable to the scheme in respect of the accounting period.

Redundancy costs

Redundancy costs are charged in the year in which the commitment has been made to the employee.

Fixed Assets

Depreciation is recognised so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets less their residual values over their useful lives on the following bases:

Equipment - over 4 years (straight line)

Assets costing less than £5,000 are not capitalised.

Stocks

Stocks are stated at the lower of cost incurred in bringing each product to its present location and condition or net realisable value.

Debtors

Debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of twelve months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

Creditors and Provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in a transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

Financial Instruments

The group only has basic financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

VAT policy

Edinburgh Children's Hospital Charity is not registered for VAT and accordingly expenditure includes VAT where appropriate. However, Task Trading Limited is registered for VAT and accordingly its income and expenditure are stated net of VAT, other than irrecoverable VAT.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity. Designated funds are unrestricted funds which have been granted by the Trustees for particular purposes from which the expenditure has not been incurred. Restricted funds are subject to restrictions on their expenditure imposed by the donor or through the terms of an appeal. Transfers between restricted funds are made where special purpose activities are continuing but the delivery has changed due to the closure of, for example, a ward. Such transfers are separately disclosed in note 11. Where other transfers are required the reasons are noted in the appropriate funds note.

17. CONTINGENT LIABILITY

The charity has received a grant totaling £34,500. This grant is subject to a termination agreement which states that should the project fail to deliver the charitable benefit for certain reasons (including disposing of property, ceasing to trade, or there being a significant change in the nature or focus of the charity's operations), then the money can be reclaimed by the funder on a sliding scale over five years, ending 31 May 2023.

18. RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

Certain expenses of Task Trading are paid by Edinburgh Children's Hospital Charity and were reimbursed during the period. The amounts due from Task Trading at 31 December 2021 represented £22,789 (£50,659 in 2020) in respect of net income by Edinburgh Children's Hospital Charity on behalf of Task Trading.

One Trustee, John Brodie (CEO of Scotmid), has continued to support our retail activities throughout the year.

One Trustee, Fiona Linklater was a Director at Lindsays. During 2021 we received employment law advice from a colleague of Fiona's at Lindsays to the value of £324.
